VDI scale for reporting an odour complaint.

Feedback or Odour complaints can be reported to Redvale Landfill through three different methods,



To work with us, please provide constructive feedback only, which includes the following information,

- 1. Time and location of the odour
- 2. Type of the odour
- 3. Character and intensity of the odour
- 4. Frequency of the odour how often it occurs, duration of the odour and time of exposure.

VDI scale example below on how to classify odour intensity.

Odour Intensity




Odour Intensity: The perceived strength of an odour above its threshold. It is determined by an odour panel and is described in categories that progress from "Not perceptible"; "Very Weak"; "Weak"; "Distinct", "Strong", "Very Strong", to "Extremely Strong".

The best way of assessing odour is via the human nose. But everyone reacts to odours differently. One person may object strongly to an odour while another is not bothered by it. The only objective method to assess odours is a calibrated nose that has completed Olfactometric measurement.

Frequency Scale

Odour frequency: The perceived duration of time or exposure experienced.

<u>Glen Jujnovich – WM's perspective on Auckland's waste future</u>

Kia ora,

As WM's representative on the Redvale Community Liaison Committee, I'd like to thank everyone who's taken an interest in Auckland's waste future and shared their thoughts through the consultation or in forums like this newsletter. The conversations we've had, including at the Dairy Flat community meeting, show just how much people care about the environmental, social, and cultural impacts of waste infrastructure.

Let me take a moment to clarify where things currently stand (at the time of writing, 2 May 2025).

WM's consultation, Managing Auckland's Residual Waste 2029–2036, is open until 11 May. We're seeking feedback on a number of options to safely manage Auckland's residual waste after Redvale stops landfilling at the end of 2028 and before the proposed Auckland Regional Landfill (ARL) could open in the mid-2030s.

This is a real challenge. Redvale currently manages about half of Auckland's waste. With ARL still seeking consent, there's a 7-to-8-year gap where an interim solution is needed. That's what this consultation is about: how best to manage those years in a way that's safe, affordable, and as sustainable as possible.

The options being consulted on are:

- 1. **Rebalancing existing landfills**, which may include Redvale, but would require new consents and community input.
- 2. Identifying a new temporary landfill, though this is unlikely to be viable in time.
- 3. **Exploring alternative technologies**, which face challenges in cost, consent and emissions.
- 4. **Auckland recovers more**, with a strong focus on waste minimisation, but recognising that not all waste can be recycled or recovered.

While independent technical advice ranked Option 1 highest against practical criteria (timing, cost, environmental and social impact), WM has made no final decisions. That will happen only after community feedback, iwi engagement, and a full review of submissions. We want to hear your views.

I understand the concerns that have been raised and the deep feelings involved. That's why this consultation exists, to give everyone a chance to shape what happens next. Thank you to everyone who took the time to make a submission. By the time you read this, the consultation period will have closed (11 May 2025). Over the coming weeks, WM will review all submissions and engage with iwi, community groups, and stakeholders to determine next steps. We'll be coming back to the community with the outcomes of the consultation and where to from here.

Hello neighbours and friends!

The summer dry has been replaced by the winter wet and with it an influx of rats & mice seeking dry places to nest for the colder months. Have you noticed? They are definitely there and will be heading for your roof, your walls, garage or barn.

Time to get trapping!

Thanks to funding from the Dairy Flat Community Trust, we sold almost 100 subsidised traps in the first 3 months of the year and you have reported 297 catches! That's 297 predators gone! Untrapped, these pests would have become well over 2000 inside a year - they breed that fast! We also hosted two very successful trapping



workshops for the community, which were very well received by all those who attended. We hope to run more in the future, so if you missed out this time round, please register on our Facebook page to get updates. Well done everybody and please remember to report your catches to us every month by sending an email to pestfreedairyflat.trappingdata@gmail.com . Keep up the good work!

Did you know that PFDF now offers heavily subsidised traps for all local residents. Register on our Facebook page or send us an email! Flipping timmy possum traps @ \$50, D-Rat rat traps @ \$20. Traps for stoats, weasels and ferrets are coming soon - let us know if you want one!

Fish alert! Any healthy ecosystem must look after all its component parts. In the case of Dairy Flat & Waitoki, this means birds, plants and waterways. In February, one local resident found her creek had dried up and there were fish stuck in the pools. Closer inspection showed them to be banded kokopu and short-finned eels, both endangered species. She managed to rescue some and is now aiming to restore the creek, where weeds have blocked it. Next step is to plant the edges with native species that provide shade and help protect the water.

Plant some natives! It's planting season, so anyone with a bit of 'dead space' on their block, or plans to restore an area or a stream margin, this is the time to do it. Talk to our friends at Scrub Ecology for details of their excellent eco-sourced native plants. Or contact us as we may be able to help.

Update from Louise Johnston, Rodney Local Board Member: Dairy Flat subdivision.

As part of my role on the Rodney Local Board, I attend the Redvale Community Liaison Committee meeting every quarter. At the meetings, there are representatives from Waste Management (WM), Council compliance staff, residents and members of Redvale Environmental Protection Society. So, after being told for years by WM staff that the landfill in Dairy Flat will cease receiving waste in 2028, I was shocked to read in the Herald that WM are proposing to extend the Landfill in Dairy Flat. To date, WM have not yet lodged a resource consent application to extend the landfill at Dairy Flat or applied for an extension via the new Fast Track legislation However, I imagine that the applications are already to go and will lodged as soon as WM complete their consultation with the public regarding WM's role in the future of Auckland's of waste. I will be disappointed if the application is lodged under the new Fast Track Approvals legislation given the contentious nature of a landfill extension. Dairy Flat residents need to have their voices heard by independent commissioners and have the right to appeal any decision to the Environment Court. It is well documented that having a landfill in your community has massive social, physical and environmental impacts and this needs to be acknowledged.

Update on our park at Green Road, Dairy Flat:

At our Rodney Local Board workshop in early April, NZTA presented the proposed environmental Penlink offset mitigation planting plans for our 154 Hectare Park at Green Road. The proposed planting, offsets and compensates for the environmental impacts of the Penlink project. This offset planting at Green Road Park also includes pest plant removal, animal pest control in the planted areas until 2028, and new fencing. Subject to Local Board approval, the planting is due to start in Autumn and be completed by 2026. The planting is to be maintained by NZTA for 5 years. This proposal is such a massive win for the Green Road Park!

The two new bridges awaiting construction on Green Road Park that form part of the pathway finally have resource consent subject to several conditions which are being finalised. The bridge construction hopefully can start before winter. I must admit that I have found it frustrating how long these resource consents have taken especially as Council are considered a platinum customer for consenting.

The Green Road Park Supporters Group together with Council are coordinating a community planting day on Saturday the 7th of June. There are 3800 plants to plant and kick off is 9am. This is our park and it a great opportunity to get involved and check out the biggest neighbourhood park in Auckland. Dairy Flat category 3 property buy outs:

"And if you do want to compete in any sport, you really do need to arrive at least a week before the event to get used to the thin air."



Dear Readers,

Welcome to the second newsletter of 2025, written on 1 May. Looking back at the first newsletter of this year, I mentioned in the third or fourth paragraphs that "the landfill will cease taking in waste by the end of December 2028". Sadly, on 17 March I awoke to see an online article in the Herald about how Auckland was facing a waste crisis and that the best solution was to extend the Redvale landfill closure through to 2036. I say sadly, as everybody on the CLC (excluding Waste Management staff) were under the impression that the landfill's closure was three (3) years away.

On the evening of 17 March, senior staff from Waste Management showed a Power Point presentation to most of the members of the Community Liaison Committee (CLC) and their plan to take the Power Point presentation to the entire Auckland community, with meetings planned for South and East Auckland, one for North Auckland, one for West Auckland and one specifically for the Dairy Flat community. Two members of the public attended the South and East meeting, one attended the North meeting, one attended the West meeting and 35 attended the Dairy Flat meeting.

Waste Management said that the purpose of these meeting was to seek feedback from the public as to what would be the best way forward in terms of waste disposal over the next few years as there will be a period between Redvale's closure and the new landfill coming on stream in the Wayby (Dome) valley (which is still currently going through the court process).

Readers are encouraged to submit feedback and such feedback needs to be submitted by 11 May.

Going back to the first article I wrote for this newsletter, (in January 2019) I stated that "the next ten years are going to be very interesting in terms of Waste Management looking to establish a new, bigger and better landfill north of Auckland and once all the red tape has been worked through (a process which could take a few years), it will start taking in a substantial portion of Auckland city's waste and the fill going to Redvale will diminish and ideally, cease by 2028."

I closed the 2019 newsletter with the following: "I look forward to what the future holds for all of us and will do my best to ensure that the Redvale Community Liaison Committee plays a role as it is intended as we move forward during these exciting times. It is the Redvale Community Liaison Committee's role to be the forum through which the Redvale community which is impacted by the landfill can bring matters to the attention of those who sit on this committee and for it to then look for workable solutions and I urge all readers to please use this forum to achieve the goals as envisioned."


